

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Discuss the story and write your answers together.


What is a boo-boo and where was Buzzy's boo-boo?

Buzzy's Boo-Boo

Each resource/activity which accompanies the title, includes an interactive activity, Pause & Ponder, to help children understand and explore a deeper understanding of what the story means to them. After children view the story for the first time, view the story again using the Pause & Ponder, pausing at the timestamps provided, to discuss the why questions with the children. These questions are designed to help children make inferences about and explain several story events. Then follow-up with the probing questions provided in the after viewing section of the Pause & Ponder to support children's ability to answer broader explanation questions. But, above all, enjoy!










© B is for Bandage
