

Activity Ideas

Inflection/Punctuation Activity

Modeling reading out loud to your child helps them hear your oral expression and pacing; and points out punctuation marks. Try different voices. Read with a different accent, change your volume, or project a particular emotion in your voice. Suggestions: sad person, fast / slow talker, whisperer, cowboy, princess, monster, robot, silly, angry, excited, and confused.

Punctuation Discussion

Discuss with children the effects that punctuation has on our voices when we read. Practice asking questions (?), sharing exciting news(!), making a statement (.), and sharing a list of things (,). This can be completed as a whole class, small groups or with partners.


Punctuation Chart
